



Best wishes for a Happy and Healthy 2017 to you, your family and your friends.

I sure did enjoy the Family Christmas Party; it was great to see so many club and family members. Several of our newest members attended; hopefully they got to see why we have such a great group – participation and support. Our first Christmas celebration was a cake, cookies and some beverages after our December meeting in 2010. We have certainly moved on from that small gathering.

Our ARES group had an active year. After beginning the year with 24 members we have added six more operators to our roster.

We also added two Assistant ECs; David Ridgeway (KK4SUO) and Mark Clark (KW4VB). David is our liaison to CERT and Mark is our liaison to the Sheriff's Department.

One of our more active "response teams" is the Sylvan Grove team. They have activated the Sylvan Grove station regularly for the monthly Hospital Net and the skill level of that group continues

to improve. Thanks to Dan and his hospital team (W4DED, KK4BKF, KK4GNO, KK4KUF, KM4NRP and WX4ED). Not only did our hospital hams activate the station for the monthly nets, they also were active during several state and local exercises. I believe we have one of the best ARES/Hospital relationships in Georgia.

We have had some excellent training opportunities in 2016. A big "thank you" goes to Mike (AJ4GU) for spearheading the digital training sessions. David Benoist (AG4ZR) took some time from his busy schedule to assist Mike at our Fldigi class. David was, at the time, our Section EC. He is now the Georgia Section Manager. We also need to thank Roy Baker (AJ4GT) for making the arrangements for the use the Clayton Co. Fire Department's training facility. Our ARES group also supported the county's EMA/OHS and Fire Department with the Pipeline Explosion Table Top and Full Scale exercises. Both events were great training for all of those involved and included a hard-to-get WebEOC. During the training session on FSX we were able to demonstrate the redundant capabilities of ham radio.

We really had a "hot time" at Field Day. Not the results we had hoped for but considering the

heat, humidity and band conditions, it turned out to be a successful event. We had a total of 405 QSOs for a score of 1900 points and, in spite of the weather; we had 55 participants or visitors. A big thank you to Darlene (KK4BKF) for organizing the Annual Family Picnic held on Saturday afternoon. The FD2017 committee is already hard at work on our next event.

Members of our ARES group participated in several Public Service events in Covington, Morgan County and Atlanta: Covington Century, Spin for Kids, Peachtree Road Race and Publix Marathon. We were also invited to provide some local support to the Red Devil Football Alumni "5K Fun Run." We have been

asked to return in 2017. Mark (KW4VB) is heading up that project. Those activities are a great way to put ham radio out in to the public eye; the event participants are always glad to see us. It is great training, too.

Our ARES team continues to be "one to watch" however, there is STILL one area where we have really fallen short of expectations (mine anyway!). We have thirty members on our ACTIVE roster, but only nineteen members have completed the Basic ARES Course (ARRL 01 or Gwinnett), fourteen have completed IS-

100 and IS-700 and only thirteen members have completed all of the required IS courses. There will probably be an "Aux Comm" class in 2017 and only General class hams with all the Georgia required ARES courses are eligible for this excellent training opportunity. Please check your GA ARES page and verify your training information is correct.

I will admit that I fell short on one of my ARES goals for 2016. We did not get anything installed at the Butts County Public Health office, not even an antenna. I'll keep it on the list for 2017.

As I have said many times, "This is the best hobby in the world." We meet new people, make new friends, we serve our neighbors, advance technology and we have a whole lot of fun. There are no "green fees." We don't have to rely on infrastructure so ham radio is often (usually) the last resort communication system available. "When all else fails..."








WX4BCA REPEATER COVERAGE RFINDER MODEL











Tech Notes

TECH NOTES - WHIT (WA4VBX)

Have you ever discovered that the batteries were left too long in an electronic device and that the batteries LEAKED?

This situation, if left long enough, can cause the terminals to corrode and not make a good electrical connection. Sometimes a minor cleaning is all that is required. If the terminals are corroded, they will need to be scraped with a knife, ice pick, screw driver, or some other implement. The scraping needs to be as complete as can be done. Sometimes the terminals are hard to get to and are difficult to scrape clean.

After the terminals are scraped as good as possible, put some solder flux on the terminal(s). Don't be stingy with the flux, but don't get carried away either. Heat the flux, and add solder and tin the terminal(s). This method may not look very pretty, but with good electrical connections your electronic device can be put back into service. Be careful and do the soldering as quickly as possible to avoid melting the plastic that holds the terminal(s) in place.

Below are two pictures. One shows a corroded contact, and the other shows the contact that have been tinned. This process has been successfully utilized on flashlights, radios and other battery operated equipment.
