The November Repeater features our on Mark Clark. Let's get to know Mark better through her personal perspective of the diverse hobby of HAM radio.

Mark Clark—NI2Y

In which year were you first licensed? 1980 then lapsed for the mid 1980's until January 2016 What aspect of HAM radio first interested you in the hobby? In my childhood I was an avid broadcast shortwave listener. I have been a lifelong tinkerer and enjoy experimental aspect of the hobby. Each shack is in effect an experiment in grounding, antenna theory, and power supply.

What type of radio was your first radio? My very first radio was Knight Kit Star Roamer home built receiver. When I resumed the hobby, my first radio was a Kenwood HT.

What is your favorite radio? The ICOM IC-7300 which has remote capability and an internal sound card..

Which aspect of HAM radio interests you most now. The integration of computing with amateur radio for digital modes.

What future area of HAM radio would you consider learning more about?

Are any of your relatives licensed HAMs? I had an uncle who worked for AT&T in Allentown, PA. He had all kinds of equipment including teletypes and home built radios.

What is your most interesting contact? WA1A

Are there any licensing and/or operating regulations that you would like to be changed? My preferences vary day to day. I certainly agree with the changes that "opened" our hobby to more members. A special code proficiency category could co-exist in parallel as an add on certification to encourage preservation of this original digital mode.

Where is your station located? It is in my shop. I have to take extra precautions to limit and protect my equipment from dust. The remote capability permits me to use the HF radio from inside the house. I am also able remotely disconnect power and the antennas for safety. So far there is no remote management set up for my UHF/VHF radio.

How could amateur radio attract more young members? This topic is a frequent conversation among HAMs. Involved parents seem to be a key influence The hobby is competing with life's other distractions. Despite this fact the numbers are growing. The digital modes would seem to offer appeal to the text and non face to face styles of conversation of the youth.

Which club activity do you enjoy most? The monthly presentations at our meeting. They are well thought out and we are fortunate that our program director is able to attract excellent speakers and topics for our programs.

What advice would you give to new HAMs? Participation in a group is very beneficial. The aggregate knowledge can get one through the bumps in the road. Keep it simple for the first year.

Is there any information about you or comments that you would like to add? Everyone will meet challenges along the way. Some are frustrating. Reach out for help and help is on the way.

NOTES FROM THE BACKACRE - K3GWK



Whew, what a year we had. In addition to our usual schedule of training and events we added three 5K races to our list of support opportunities. We now assist with three reoccurring, Butts County race events - all of them use Peachtree Road Race approved 5K courses. Funny though that even with all that and the excellent coverage we receive from our local media, our VE Team, holding two Tech Classes, Field Day and the BB&BG special event, we are still the best kept secret in Butts County. On my list of ham radio related resolutions is more promotion of our radio club. I had the opportunity to try out a public service group presentation recently and received good reviews. I'd like to get that presentation in front of all of Butts County's civic organizations. If any of you know a member of one of these groups (Lions, Exchange Club, Rotary, etc), let me know.

We ended the year with a total of 106 Training Nets, 74 Drills and Training Events, 21 Public Service opportunities, 6 Emergency Operations and 28 Miscellaneous Events; total Ham Hours for 2017 was 4,547. In Georgia the estimated value of volunteer hours is \$24.39 so our value to Butts County was over \$110,900. Not bad – thanks again for all you do.

We have a great club year shaping up, more guest presenters (DX'ing, SDR Radios, Satellite Operations, Grounding, etc.). We will kick the year off with a HIPAA update and Sylvan Grove Volunteer update. It is important that we grow our support for Sylvan Grove Hospital – we played an important role there during the IRMA event. The hospital has given us permission to relocate and expand our station. We are still struggling with the internet connectivity issue. Internet security is a big issue, especially for a hospital network. If hospitals want our help, Internet access is a problem to be solved.

I've become radio-active again, thanks in part to Dr. Joe Taylor (K1JT) and his digital modes. FT8 and JT65 are my favorites with FT8 the current "flavor of the month". My original SSB (all band) Worked All States award

took me years to complete, 1988 to 2008. I have all the contacts I need for a Digital WAS – it took the month of December to complete. Being retired helped a little. H!!

I'm looking forward to the GA ARES Convention on January 13 down at GPSTC. We are so luck to only live 15 minutes away, every BCECA member should plan to attend. Hopefully, you have been able to register for the classes you wanted. The Advanced SKYWARN Class was one of the sessions on my "Must Do" list along with DRATS, ICS Forms and the Digital Q&A session.

Need some Net Controllers for Feb and later on...

(we had 5 last yr, KW4AQ, KK4BKF, K3GWK, KK4QJR, KM4HOS),

not much different than a voice-only net except for:you need to be savvy w/ FLDigi and have a set of macros. (had 3, BKF, GWK, HOS)

You need to be savvy w/ WL Express, w/ WX4BCA password, etc (had 2, NI2Y, HOS)

Not too difficult if the village idiot (that'd be me) can handle it, just takes practice & organization.

Gonna be tough in a real situation, AJ4GU's gonna be in ATL, K3GWK will be in EOC or maybe ATL, W4DED & WX4ED might be stuck in Fayetteville & Zebulon, I might be on da road, so... are we gonna be able to DO what we SAY we can do. Can we handle the Hospital & BCHD (and EOC if Buzz is in ATL). Bein' a Net Controller will show you where you need to get better organized, w/ your radios, computer, logging and troubleshootin', so when an 'event' occurs, and things are moving and CHANGING fast, you're flexible enuf to flow w/ it. Our ARES group needs a Plan B, right now we're marginal on Plan A. We need to have more redundancy to handle the unexpected.

When reporting digital activity each wk, the final entries are not MSG's... they're FORMS like ICS-213's or Radiograms. A simple, typed FLDigi chk-in is a 'message', but we don't track those, we track forms used during our nets, total forms, forms tx'd & forms rx'd.
