MORE THAN 1,000 CONTACTS AT FIELD DAY 2015

Field Day 2015 is now history. And we certainly made some club history! This was our fourth Field Day for the Butts County Emergency Communicator's Auxiliary (Butts County Amateur Radio Club) and the first time Field Day has been held inside Butts County.

Another historic precedent was the "3A" status of our station. In the past we have operated as a "2A" club. This year we fielded three stations working simultaneously with an operator and a logger. Last year we took first place in the 2A category in Georgia; we'll have to wait



through thunderstorms, 40 mile-an-hour winds and a good deal of rain. We (and more importantly) our equipment stayed dry although we did have to "unplug" twice Saturday afternoon during some very close lightning strikes.

The day started with a great breakfast at the Lunchbox Restaurant where we filled the large table and two booths. Rain didn't dampen our spirits (or appetites) for a wonderful afternoon picnic of hamburgers, hotdogs, side dishes and some scrumptious desserts. The third historical piece is that we logged 1,096 contacts! Of course, these will be compared with all the other stations' logs to determine the final score. But this number of contacts is sure to put us near the top of the 3A category.



We are going to make a change to how ACTIVE and DEPLOYABLE status is determined. In order to remain on the ACTIVE roster, ARES members will have to have participated in one activity over a 6 month period, the Basic ARES course is recommended. DEPLOYABLE status will require one activity in a 3 month period plus Basic ARES and IS 100, 200, 700 and 800. IS 802 is recommended but is being revised and may not be available on line. CERT membership is also recommended. ARES Membership is not required to belong to the ham radio club.

The equipment for the ham station at Sylvan Grove Hospital has

> arrived. The FT-450D, the MFJ Tuner and the power supply made an appearance at Field Day but it did not see any action. We also have an ICOM ID-5100 FM rig

(with D-Star) and a Signalink for digital operation. The station will be located in the switchgear room in the basement (under the cafeteria). The repeater will also be re-located to that location; much cleaner and cooler than the boiler room. As soon as the hospital engineering department gets the area prepared we will be moving in. I am hoping for the 3rd Saturday in August.

The Butts County Amateur Radio Emergency Service group will host its annual field day preparedness exercise June 27 and 28 in the Tim Kersey pavilion in the Butts County Department of Leisure Services sports complex off Ernest Biles Drive.

"In the past, we've held our field day operation at a church picnic pavilion in Locust Grove," said Buzz Kutcher, a member of the Butts County ham radio group and the Amateur Radio Emergency Service emergency coordinator. He serves as the liaison between area ham radio operators and Butts County emergency services. "Our Butts County ARES team is participating in national Amateur Radio Field Day," Kutcher said. "We'll begin setting up at 9 a.m. Saturday. Our on-the-air activities will start at 2 p.m. Saturday and continue non-stop until noon Sunday. There will be three complete portable amateur radio stations operating simultaneously."

All the radio stations will be powered by batteries or a portable generator. There will also be a GOTA (get on the air) station and coach available for hands-on demonstrations for visitors.

"People are welcome any time. There's always someone available to guide you around the site, introduce you to our members and explain what is going on," Kutcher said.

Ham radio field days started in North America in 1933 to allow ham operators to set up in public locations to showcase the science and skill involved in operating an amateur radio. In addition to experimenting with electronics and communications techniques, amateur radio operators can provide a public service to their communities in a time of disaster when other communication lines are inoperable.

Field Day aims to demonstrate ham radio's ability to work under almost any condition from nearly any location to create an independent communications network free from cellphones or the internet.
